Central Queensland University (Bachelor of Learning Management/Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Jazz Studies)	Data not available
Charles Darwin University - Bachelor of Learning and Teaching/Bachelor of Creative Arts and Industries	Classical and contemporary music majors, either separate or combined. Mainly introductory and intermediate courses in music, with some music project options.
Deakin University - Bachelor of Arts/Bachelor of Teaching	Students need 8 credit points of music (out of 32 credit points)
Edith Cowan University - Bachelor of Arts (Education)/Bachelor of Arts (Creative Arts)	Music major available, entry based on audition and traditional/contemporary music subjects offered in conjunction with education subjects. Designed for secondary music teaching.
Griffith University	Bachelor of Music, Grad Dip in Education - 4 years study on music, then 1 year grad dip education
James Cook University - Bachelor of Education and Bachelor of Music/Bachelor of Education	Music curriculum studies offered (ED3220) - 3 cp, 13 hours total. Also offered is a Bachelor of Music/Bachelor of Education for music specialist teachers. Available to BEd (Secondary) Graduate BEd (Secondary) BMusBEd and level 3 BMus students. Also available as an elective subject to BEd students with lecturer approval. The subject comprises two strands a critical study of selected music education philosophies theories and methodologies of the 20th and 21st centuries and issues related to their implementation and a study of the Queensland music syllabus for Years 110 associated music planning and assessment.
Monash University - Bachelor of Music/Bachelor of Education; Bachelor of Arts/Bachelor of Education	108 cp in music, majoring in performance/composition/or musicology, and 96 cp in education. Also available as arts major (48 cp), minor (24 cp), arts 1st yr sequence (12cp) or further arts studies (12 cp).
Queensland University of Technology - Bachelor of Music/Bachelor of Education (Secondary)	432 cp total - enables students to teach secondary music in Australian schools. Students can learn other subjects to teach on top of music or focus on becoming instrumental music teachers as well as classroom music teachers. Graduates can also teach in primary schools.
Southern Cross University - Bachelor of Education (Secondary); Bachelor of Education combined with Bachelor of Contemporary Music	EDU01143 Curriculum Specialisation - Music I; EDU01144 Curriculum Specialisation - Music II (chosen as an elective) EDU01143: Designed to provide students with an understanding of teaching non-elective music in secondary schools. Special emphasis will be placed upon the areas of educational planning, variety of teaching strategies and the development of classroom resources. University of New England - Bachelor of Music/Bachelor of Teaching	96 cp of music, 96 cp of education, over 4 years fulltime. Students study core components of B.Mus degree and can major in performance, composition or musicology.
University of New South Wales - Bachelor of Music/Bachelor of Education	The BMusBEd offers an integrated training in six major areas Musicology Musicianship Music Education Studies Performance Studies Education Studies and Contextual Studies. Graduates are qualified to teach classroom and instrumental/vocal music from kindergarten to Year 12 and are accredited to teach in all Australian states.
University of Newcastle - Bachelor of Teaching/Bachelor of Music	The Bachelor of Teaching/Bachelor of Music involves completion of Music courses and Teaching courses. The Bachelor of Music component consists of a major study in Performance Ensemble Studies Studies in Western Music and Music Technology. In the Education component of the degree courses are offered under four strands Teaching and Learning (including Special Education) Specialist Teaching methods Experience and schoolbased project. The final year of the program consists entirely of teaching studies and professional preparation culminating in an internship. 320 units total.

<p>University of Queensland - Bachelor of Music/Bachelor of Education</p>	<p>The Bachelor of Music/Bachelor of Education program is tailored specifically for students wishing to pursue a career in music education. This program offers students two years of intensive training on their chosen instrument (including voice) and three years of combined music and education courses. The Bachelor of Music/Bachelor of Education dual degree has an excellent reputation for preparing music specialist teachers. Professional (final) Year students have the opportunity to undertake teaching area courses that investigate the P12 Music syllabus instrumental teaching and choral music education. Graduates are thoroughly prepared for the variety of teaching expected of music teachers throughout primary and secondary school.</p>
<p>University of Southern Queensland - Bachelor of Music/Bachelor of Education</p>	<p>The Bachelor of Music and Bachelor of Education (Secondary) is designed to prepare teachers for employment in both compulsory and postcompulsory education sectors and to satisfy the National Competency Framework for Beginning Teaching as outlined below: using and developing professional knowledge and values, communicating interacting and working with students and others, planning and managing the teaching and learning process, monitoring and assessing student progress and learning outcomes, reflecting evaluating and planning for continuous improvement. Underlying these objectives is the important principle that teacher education is a continuing process embracing both preservice and inservice education. Accordingly graduates of the Bachelor of Music and Bachelor of Education (Secondary) program will be competent beginning teachers able to assume a continuing responsibility for their own professional and career development.</p>
<p>University of Sydney - Bachelor of Music Education</p>	<p>The Bachelor of Music is a fouryear degree for musically talented students who aspire to a professional career in music. The Music Education specialisation is intended primarily as a professional training course for students wishing to become music teachers in a school environment. In addition to music teaching methods music history and analysis performance and compositional skills and knowledge students must have attained information and communication technology competencies and have developed an understanding of children with special educational needs. In order to satisfy these requirements the Music Education degree has a large core of mandated music education and general education units of study. The major focus of this specialisation is on developing teaching skills through studies in education choral and instrumental pedagogy and music technology. For Music Education specialists Principal Study is available in brass early music performance jazz performance piano organ percussion strings vocal studies woodwind composition and musicology.</p>
<p>University of WA - Bachelor of Music Education</p>	<p>This course provides you with the necessary skills and knowledge to operate as multiskilled and versatile professional in areas such as performance (both choral and instrumental) conducting composing/arranging improvising and utilising music technology. Graduates from this course are qualified to teach classroom music at both primary and secondary levels as well as in a second teaching area which may be either instrumental music or an approved nonmusic subject such as English Mathematics Social Studies Computer Science or Vocational Education.</p>
<p>University of Tasmania - Bachelor of Music/Bachelor of Teaching</p>	<p>To qualify for the Bachelor of Music and Bachelor of Teaching students must successfully complete 400% from units in the BMus and BTeach schedules. 212.5% is required for the BMus component and 187.5% for the BTeach component. 212.5% Music comprises a compulsory core of 14 x 12.5% 3 x 12.5% music electives (classical voice students must take Diction composition students must take Music Typesetting as one of their electives) These units will be taken as follows 100% in first year 62.5% in second year and 50% in the third year of the course. 187.5% Education comprises the units listed in the course schedule.</p>
